- How exciting to see the new place I'm going to be living in! I'll be meeting different people and making new friends. I'm so happy!

As soon as she arrived at the family shelter she ran off to meet the other children and to see the toys she would be able to play with from then on.

They were soon told how the home worked, which made them feel more relaxed. And, in a whisper, they were asked to keep a very important secret:

- Don't tell anyone you live in this home. This is a secret place that no one must know about.

As the days rolled by, they saw that everyone who worked in the house always helped them with everything they needed. And they also found support from the other mothers and children who lived with them.





Quico and Tula were not the only people who lived in the family shelter. It was a big house with many families living in it, each of whom had their own bedroom, with large bunk-beds and a bath that made them feel at home. Everyone would take a



shower and clean their teeth every day without much queuing.

The two children would act out stories of boats and fishing. Of course, they always left everything clean and tidy after them, ready for their next aquatic adventure.

There was a key to each bedroom, which every *mummy* carried with her

The house had many other places, besides the bedrooms, which were shared and had to be looked after by everyone.



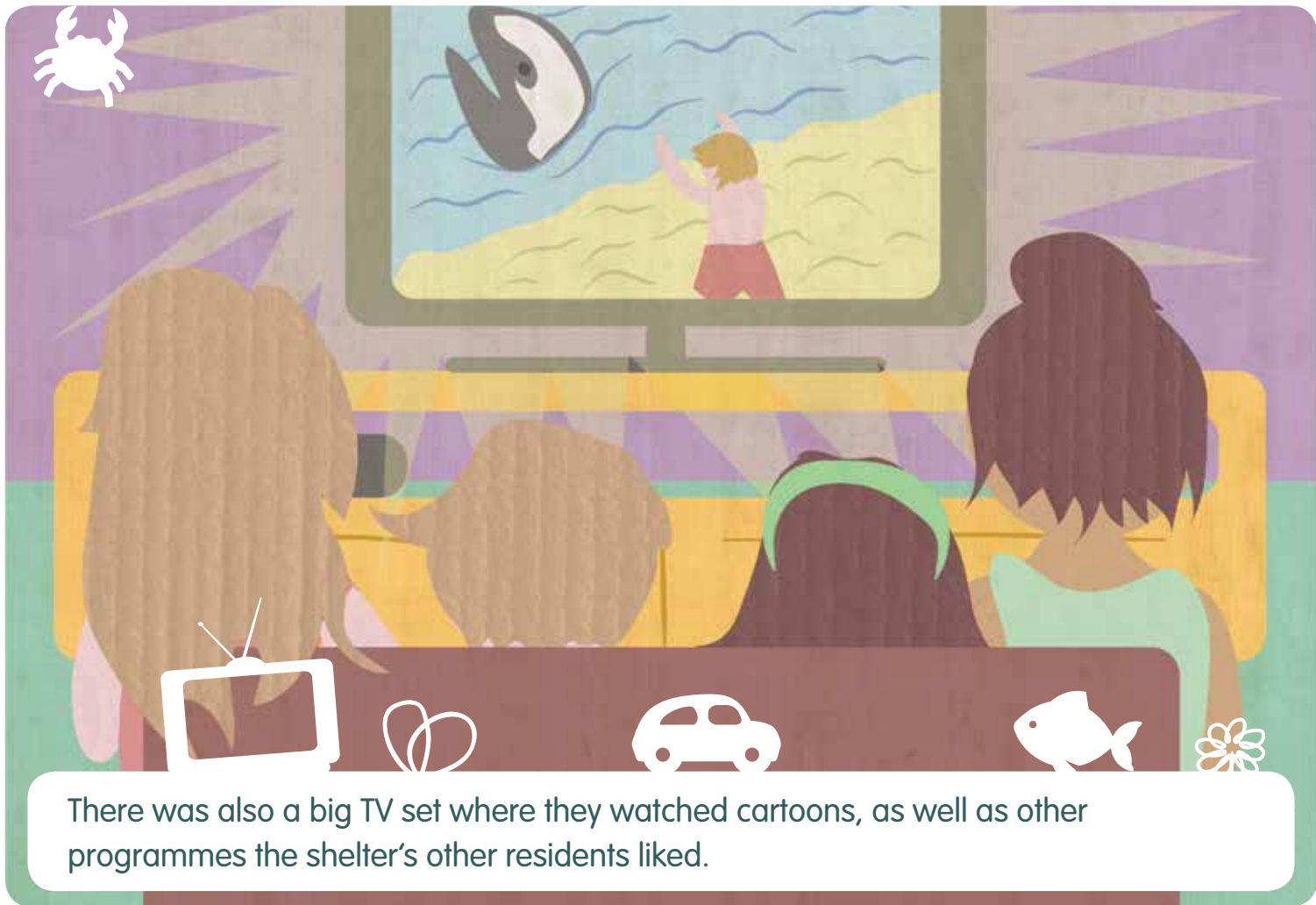
One of these was the dining room, which was only open at certain times during the day, just like a school canteen. The difference here was that there were no monitors. Quico and Tula always used to say:

After supper, they would spend a quiet moment in the dining room. Then they could go upstairs with their *mums* to their bedrooms, to rest and “recharge their batteries” for the next day.



Since then, every time a new child arrives they tell them how they felt when they first arrived. If you feel like Quico, nervous and not keen on talking, or like Tula, excited and keen to run,
